Website Evaluation

Authority

- who is responsible for the site?
- Does the information come from a credible source?
- Example:
 - Doctors create medical websites

Currency

- Is the site up to date?
 Example:
 - The copyright or last update

Purpose

- Why is the site on the internet?
- What information does it provide?
- Example:
 - JiJi (ST math) is meant to help you on math.

Audience

- Who did they create this website for? •
- Examples:
 - Adults
 - Teens
 - Students
 - Parents
 - Dog owners

Structure

- Is the website easy to use?
 Is it easy to find what you
- Examples:

need?

- Useful heading or titles
- Search index
